Volunteers - Ottawa Volunteers in Education

Sheila, an epidemiologist retired from the federal government, and her partner Eric, a retired uOttawa engineering professor, were driving past Charles Hulse Public School one day when Sheila said, "That school needs my help!" That was just the beginning of their 'retirement' and what is now four years of volunteer service for Sheila and Eric at this diverse socioeconomically challenged school.

Sheila helps run a crochet knit club on Tuesdays teaching young students new skills. She also helps a student with individualized speech exercises. Eric assists the grade 6 robotics club as part of the technology education curriculum, providing a rich exposure to hands-on activities for the students.

Sheila and Eric also do volunteer work at home. In the spring of 2016, they began a 5-year plan to replace some of the dated hands-on learning materials and resources in the school's classrooms, finding many replacement items at community garage sales.

They have begun helping the school principal Laurie Kavanagh write applications to private and business foundations for things that are needed by Charles Hulse students but are not covered in the school budget.

In addition to the volunteer work they do at Charles Hulse Public School, Sheila and Eric developed a bursary and scholarship website for students attending Ridgemont High School next door, working closely with the guidance teacher.

We are amazed by the dedication of Eric and Sheila, and so grateful!













ELI & TARA EDWARDS Volunteers - OttawaReads

Ottawa Police Officers Tara and Eli Edwards are volunteers with the OttawaReads early literacy program at Pinecrest Public School. Volunteering together was a choice they made to make a difference in the community and share their love of reading with young children.

Tara works in the Fatal Collision Section and Eli is a Patrol Sergeant, and together they are the parents of four active school age children. Eli joined OttawaReads in 2013 and introduced Tara as a volunteer in 2016. They share a volunteer position, taking turns reading aloud each week in a very busy Kindergarten classroom.

Principal Wanda Mills-Boone raves about the support Pinecrest School receives from the Ottawa Police Service volunteers. "We love having the Ottawa Police volunteers in the school weekly. Their presence provides a whole community feel to the school."

When asked what the benefits are of volunteering as a couple, Tara and Eli beam at each other. "Because we are both in the Ottawa Police Service, coming home and talking about work can become negative. Volunteering to read with children gives us something very positive to talk about—we have a shared common experience."

Tara and Eli eloquently summarize the benefits of volunteering, "When you place yourself in different social circumstances, it has a positive effect on you. You see life from a completely different perspective, especially when you sit in the tiny chairs! There is a positive mental health aspect to volunteering. It makes you feel good!"

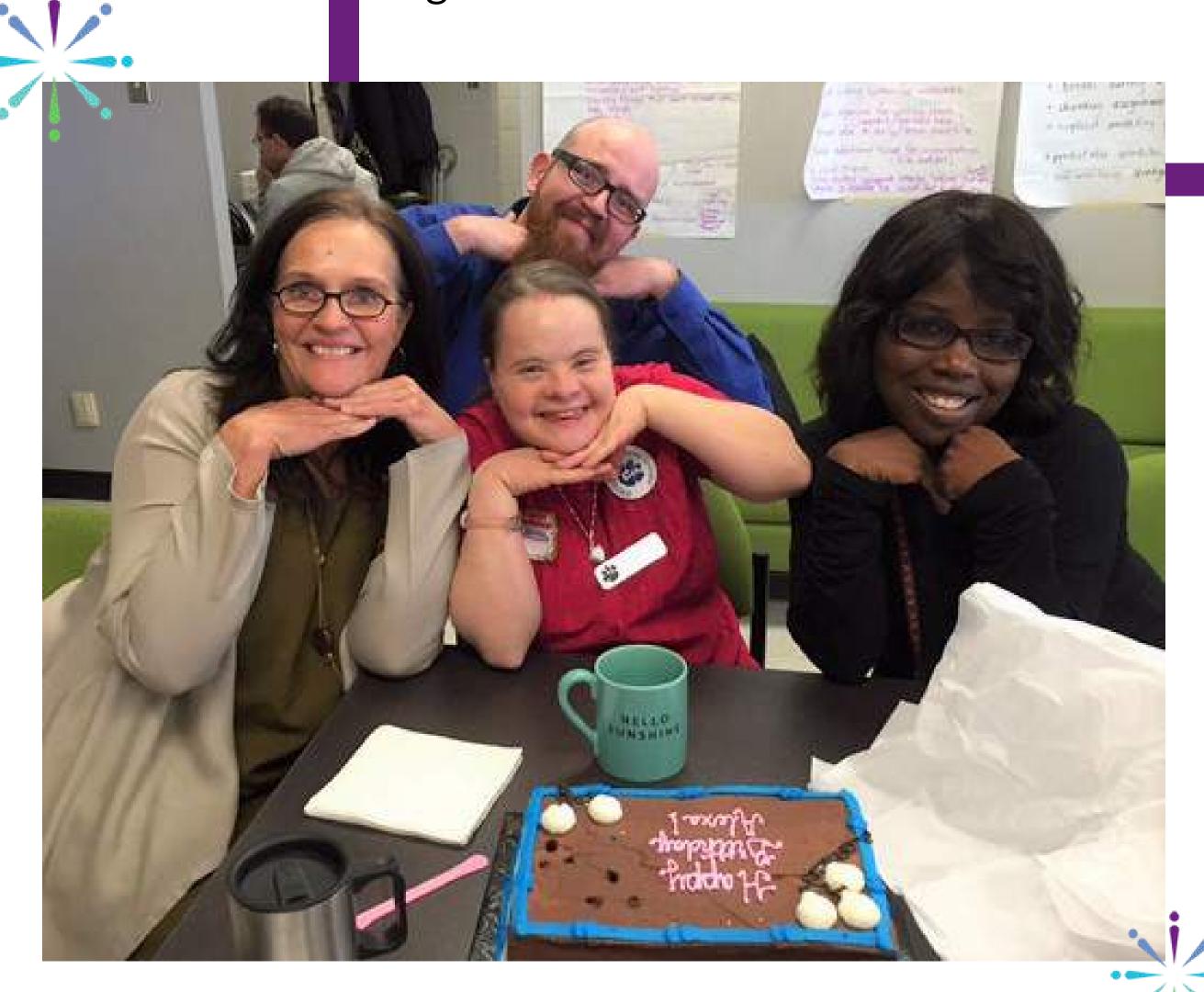
ALEXA VANVEEN

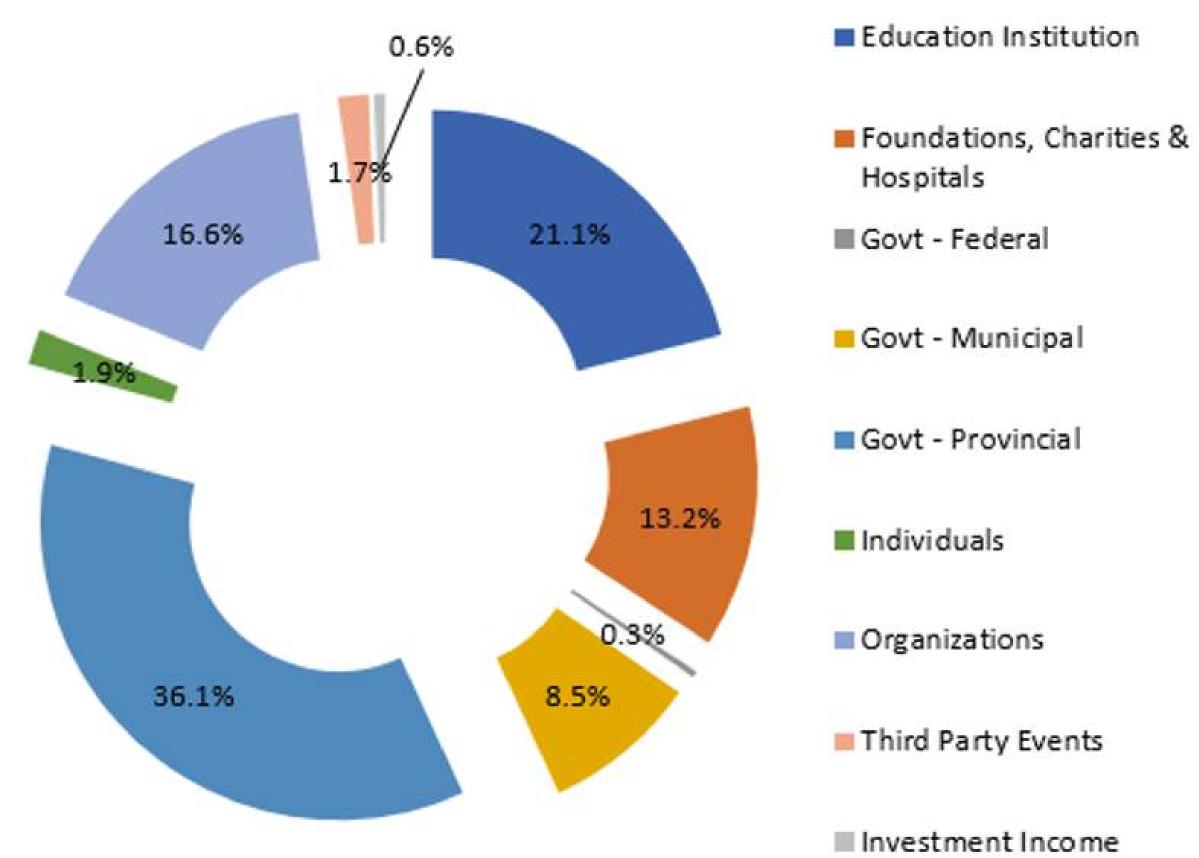

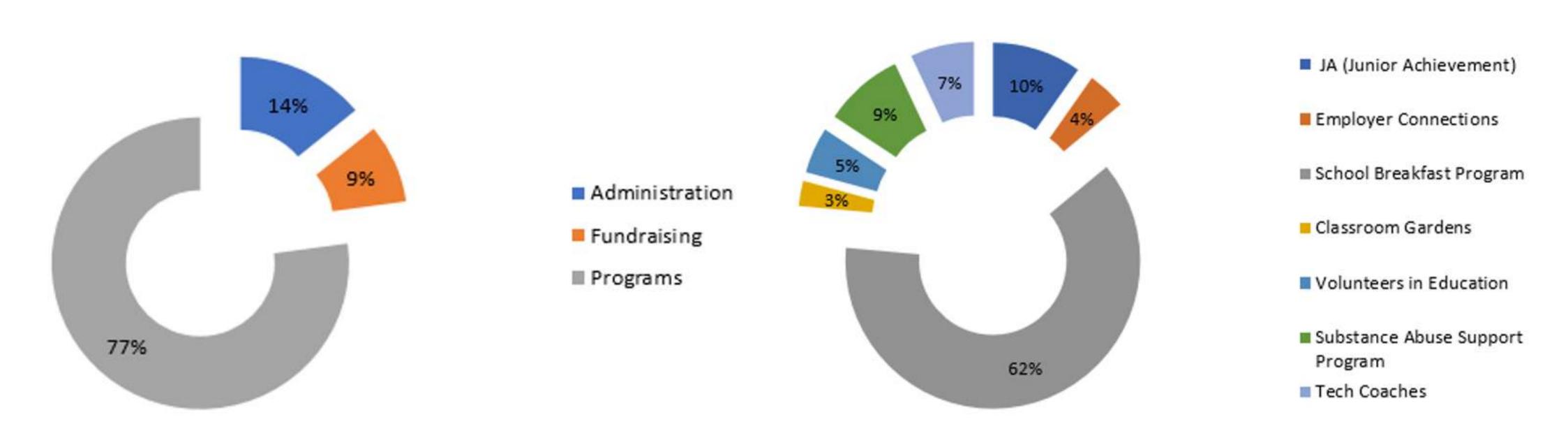
Revenue by Source
